

# TOBACCO MARKET.

At Home and Abroad.

AT BALDWINSVILLE.

There is no animation in our market. Prices are low for all grades. Cornelius McCarthy sold 7 cases 1894 at 8½ cents; John Sloan sold 35 cases of 1893 and 1894—part of the '93 at 3 cents and the balance at 4 cents, and his '94 at 7 cents. Michael Sloan sold 7 cases 1894 at 7c; Patrick Sloan, 20 cases '94 at 7 cents; Donohue & Son, 12 cases at private terms; Horace Root and Thomas Myers sold their crops at private terms. All of the above lots were sold to M. Finestone, of Syracuse, and perhaps a few other parcels. John Palmer sold his 1894 crop to C. E. Crawford at 9 cents. J. Rotaling, of Ira, sold 24 cases '93 at 3 and 1c. Additional to the above sales, 150 cases were sold chiefly for export account of the 1893 crop, at 3 cents, fillers at 1 cent per pound. The country will be relieved of low grades at the present rate of buying in a few months. The weather is dry and hot and plants need rain, though not badly. Throughout this section of Central New York, there is a great falling off in acreage. This is well. Shipments are being made from Baldwinsville direct to Germany. Messrs. Skinner & Frazee, Sleight & Tabor and Em. Dingman are in the market for export goods.

A. G. Smith, of Cato, sold 20 cases 1893 to Skinner & Frazee, at 3 cents. Horace Hall sold 27 cases to Dunham & Lee at private terms.
