

MEN HELD IN BINGHAMTON MAY BE WANTED HERE

**Detective Helm Will Go To Near-
by City To Identify Burglars
Who Robbed Stores Last
Night—May Be Two Who
Entered Keegan Store.**

Detective Sergeant Walter D. Helm and L. Burr Keegan will go to Binghamton Monday to identify, if possible, two young men who were arrested in that city last night after burglarizing two stores and who are believed to be the same pair which looted the Keegan clothing store on East State street last Tuesday night of a quantity of clothing and \$57 in cash. Descriptions of the prisoners held in Binghamton, were communicated this morning to Chief Marshall and Detective Sergeant Helm by Detective Rummer of the Binghamton Police Department and tally with those of the men who are alleged to have "pulled off" the Keegan robbery.

The Binghamton prisoners are dapper and well-dressed. The men who robbed the Keegan store donned new suits and other wearing apparel, discarding their old suits and leaving them lying on the floor of the store. According to the Binghamton authorities the prisoners admitted breaking into a Cortland store last Monday night but refused to admit being in Ithaca. The police here believe that the two men went from Ithaca to Rochester after the Keegan "job," thence back to Syracuse and to Binghamton. The men admitted coming from Syracuse to Binghamton.

Enter Two Stores in Binghamton.

The prisoners are alleged to have burglarized the Binghamton Phonograph Company in the Y. M. C. A. building in that city, taking \$19, and also looting the Binghamton Cigar Company office safe of \$64, both robberies occurring yesterday. They were arrested through the clever sleuthing of Miss Mary L. Fuhrmeyer, stenographer for the phonograph company, who followed the men to the railroad station where they were arrested just after they had boarded a train about to pull out.

The men gave the names of Robert Moynihan and Maxwell S. French. The men who are being sought by the Ithaca police gave the names when they, previous to the Keegan burglary, applied to police headquarters here for employment, as Frank Andrews, 23, and George Ryan, 24. From the description, however, of the two prisoners furnished the local police by Chief Detective Rummer of Binghamton it is believed by the local authorities that Moynihan and French are aliases for Andrews and Ryan, the alleged Keegan store burglars. They are believed to have gone from Ithaca to Rochester and then made their way back to Syracuse and Binghamton.
