

## FATAL FALL FROM A CART AT SOMERCOTES.

An inquest was held last Thursday, at the Sun Inn, Somercotes, by Dr. Green, Deputy-Coroner for the Hundred of Scarsdale, on the body of Henry Lowe, greengrocer, aged 56, who died that day from the effects of injuries received through falling out of his cart on the 7th of August. William Parkin, collier, of Leabrooks, said he was in the employ of the deceased. The accident happened on the 7th of August, when deceased was trying to prevent some hampers falling off the cart. They were at Leabrooks at the time, on the main road. The cart was laden with hampers of fruit. Deceased was sitting on a hamper on the footboard. The cartwheel went over a big stone, and deceased, with the hampers, was thrown on to his head on the road. Deceased got up, sat on the hamper in the road, and a woman bathed his head. Witness went for a doctor, and when he arrived deceased was unconscious. Deceased was quite sober at the time. It was about six o'clock at night, and they had been hawking during the afternoon. They ran over half a trick.—Parkin was recalled, and, in answer to the Deputy-Coroner, said deceased liked a glass of something to drink, but "he had never seen him so bad as all that." Deceased was sober before the accident, and he was a man of steady habits.—A verdict of "Accidental death" was returned.
